

JAG FRESHENS UP THE S-TYPE

Things are tough for Jaguar. Sales in Australia are down against the same time last year, the model line-up is not as fresh as its German rivals and the company has even ended production of the XJ flagship at its home base at Browns Lane in Britain.

But it is not all doom and gloom. Jaguar has freshened the mid-sized S-Type, with more than a nip-and-tuck on the lamps, and has finalised plans for a couple of limited-edition flag-wavers in Australia before the end of the year.

The S-Type still has a retro look and feel that draws on Jaguar's successes in the 1960s, but has been tweaked to become a little more elegant. And a bit more like the latest XJ. Jaguar says the car has modified suspension for a sportier drive and is putting the emphasis on the V8-powered cars here.

A six-pack S-Type, from \$89,990, is still the price leader and another car is tucked just inside the \$100,000 barrier, but Jaguar Australia is pushing the \$124,990 V8 and the Type R with a supercharged powerhouse at \$169,990.

It is part of a move that will eventually see Jaguar become as good as it can be, at least with Ford ownership.

Jaguar has battled through all sorts of dramas for as long as most people can remember, but the cars are good and it could easily become – like Mazda – a company that returns to its roots and leaps forward with a lift from the Ford bankroll.

Jaguar's Big Deal car for this year is the all-new XK-S. It says it is the car that shows the new Jaguar look, as well as reflecting its work on building cars that can go head-to-head – no excuses – with BMW and Mercedes-Benz.



But Jaguar Australia is not waiting for the new coupe. It even says it is making money, despite numbers showing it has been one of the few showroom losers in the first-half boom of this year.

"We are doing better than we have in the past. Financially, we're doing well," Jaguar spokesman Todd Hallenbeck says.

"We are also looking to launch two premium products before the end of the year. We will have the XK-R 4.2S and the Super V8 portfolio."

That work includes a more modern treatment of the nose – without losing the S-Type's signature four-lamp front end – and a tail that is fuller and very similar to the XJ in boot line and lamp design.

It also picks up a new instrument panel with higher-quality cabin trim and, for the first time, owners can choose not to take wood panelling.

It has an alloy bonnet and work has been done on the suspension, but Jaguar says it did most of the tough stuff i 2002's update.

ON THE ROAD

First impression? The updated S-Type has more presence. The styling changes make it a little more aggressive, a little chunkier and a little more confident.

The S-Type's original look was almost totally retro, but now it is clearly a current car.

It's hard to measure the claims on quality improvement, but the new S is pretty slick.

The new dash and dials look more modern and the gauges, while not always that easy to read, particularly the speedo in a 50km/h zone, are done well.

As for the driving, the test car was commendably smooth and nicely sporty. Not like a



V8-powered BMW, mind, but pretty good for a Jaguar.

It had been a long time between runs in an S-Type and we found the car to have a nice balance, good cornering grip and great brakes.

It is a car you ease along the road, not fighting it or forcing it to turn through corners, and that means it is a cosseting city drive with a nice turn of pace in the country. Is it a sports star? Not for us, though the

224kW engine is pretty eager and the six-speed automatic keeps it pushing along. And it also copes easily with lumps and bumps, even in twisty bits.

But we now hate Jaguar's long running J-gate automatic selector. It was exciting in the 1980s but is now out of date, left behind by the touch-change automatics of its German rivals.

We liked the luxury stuff in the S-Type, from the cushy leather seats to the parking radar, but it is what you expect from a car in this class.

Jaguar Australia has done well with pricing, which gives the car an advantage of about \$20,000 over a BMW or Benz with a V8 under the bonnet.

You can get a cheaper 5-Series or E-Class, but comparing cars with similar power gives the Jaguar a significant value boost.

It is closer in price to the latest Lexus GS430, but the Japanese car is all-new this year and an impressive device.

The Lexus doesn't have the personality of the Jaguar, but it is a better drive and you cannot question its quality.



THE BOTTOM LINE

The S-Type is better for 2005. It's not a lot better, but it looks smoother and has improved value. It has never been able to seriously threaten the German benchmark cars and that has not changed.
