JAG GETS THE CLAWS OUT

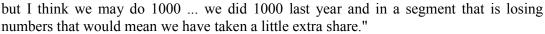
Waiting for a saviour: the all-new S-Type is due here in 2008 and in the meantime Jaguar is fighting to maintain sales

Dressed up X-Types, an oil-burning S-Type, and a spanking new pair of top-end sports cars are the key weapons in Jaguar Australia's arsenal as it prepares for the fight of its life.

"At the moment we are doing OK," says brand boss David Blackhall, who recently visited Jaguar's Castle Bromwich facility in the UK.

"We are meeting the numbers and I don't get too many phone calls from headquarters wanting to know what is going wrong.

"This year I would be happy with 900 [sales]



Despite that optimism, Blackhall is honest enough to concede that the next couple of years are going to be a hard graft to keep the numbers in the black.

Jaguar's new model roll-out begins with the XK Coupe and Convertible, which Blackhall is hoping to introduce as a pigeon pair mid 2006 but sales numbers will be small, probably less than 100 a year.

The volume car the Australian operation is desperately waiting on is the all-new S-Type, due in 2008, along with the next generation of the XJ, a model, which will no longer be restrained by attempts to make it look like heritage XJs.

"The first thing we have to do is get through 2006 and 2007," Blackhall says. "We have to meet the numbers for those years and to do that we are going to have to create some products of our own here that will keep the sales ticking over.

"If I hit a home run with XK then that is going to about eight cars a month. S-Type diesel is maybe 20 to 30 cars a year ... we are waiting on the new cars (S-Type and XJ) and in the interim it up to us to come up with something different to keep the customers interested."

Blackhall says that while diesel is one of the ideas the company will run with, he has serious reservations about whether the strategy will successfully transfer to the luxury XJ market.

"To be honest I am not sure about whether a diesel XJ would be suitable," he says. "I am still thinking about that one ... we will see how the S-Type is accepted and think about it some more."

Another of the strategies Blackhall is considering is a dressed up X-Type carrying a Sport badge.

"It will not be anything like the previous model, which wore the Sport badge," he says.

"There will be no cloth trim or anything like that but it is an idea for next year ... a \$60,000 car that looks good, looks a little different.

"Mercedes-Benz and BMW have done it well with the C Class and 3 Series dress kits.

"All the bits we need are available in the UK, it is just a matter of sorting out exactly what we want – wheels and the bits to stick on the car – and then getting it at the right price.

"We may even do a bit of sports suspension but there won't be any performance increases offered."



Blackhall says the 2.7-litre bi-turbo diesel S-Types have been ordered as January builds and should be available in showrooms around March.

"The cars will come in a single specification and that will be exactly the same as the petrol V6 luxury being sold now," Blackhall says. "Price parity with the V6 petrol car [\$99,990] is certainly what we are looking at. It is not quite settled but it is on the top of the pile on Geoff's [Polities, the boss of premium automotive group] desk."

Blackhall concedes the plan to offer the diesel model – which costs more to manufacture – at the same price as the petrol car will cause short-term pain to Jaguar Australia's bottom line but this is something he is prepared to absorb.

"We will take a bit of a hit in March [if the diesels are sold at the same price as petrol] as the diesel is a bit more expensive to get out of the factory, but that will be the deal and we will get over it," he says.
